COACHES

Sean Allen // University of Texas



Sean Allen was associate head coach for the Tulane Green Wave before being named assistant coach at Texas on June 30, 2016. The Carlsbad, N.M., native has over 15 years of coaching experience at the collegiate level. Allen has strong ties to Texas thanks to his four-year playing career at the University of Houston, where he also coached from 2002-2007.

While at Tulane, he was the lead recruiter. Prior to Tulane, Allen served as an assistant coach at Sam Houston State for three seasons. At SHSU, he helped the Bearkats to three straight Southland Conference titles. From 2008 to 2011, Allen served as an assistant coach at Florida International University.

Allen earned his bachelor's degree in sports administration from Houston in 2001. He is married to the former Stephanie Beyelia, a former soccer standout at UH.

Cory Barton // Louisiana Tech University



Cory Barton joined the Louisiana Tech baseball staff for the 2018 campaign.

Barton serves as the pitching coach for the Bulldogs after guiding the McNeese State baseball program to one of the best seasons in its history in 2017.

During his three years at McNeese, Barton served as the program's recruiting coordinator while also working with the pitching staff. Barton earned a reputation as one of the top recruiters in all of college baseball. Prior to his time at McNeese, Barton spent five seasons as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Louisiana Monroe. Barton joined the ULM staff in 2008 after two seasons as an assistant coach at Memphis and a two-year playing career with the Tigers.

Barton, a native of Trussville, Alabama, graduated from Memphis with a sport management degree in May 2007. He and his wife Robin have a 1-year-old son, Cooper.

Will Bolt // Texas A&M University



Will Bolt begins the fourth season of his second stint on the Texas A&M coaching staff in 2018. Bolt previously served a two-year stint as a volunteer assistant coach at Texas A&M in 2006-07.

The Conroe, Texas native previously spent three seasons as an associate head coach for the Nebraska Cornhuskers. Prior to his tenure at Nebraska, Bolt served four years as head coach at Texarkana College from 2008-11.

Bolt was also a four-year starter and team captain at Nebraska from 1999-2002,

where he was a two-time Academic All-Big 12 honoree. He graduated in 2003 with a degree in communication studies before earning his master's degree in 2006. Bolt and his wife, Lauren, were married in July of 2005 and they have two sons, Jaxon and Austin.

Kyle Bunn // Indiana University



Kyle Bunn enters his fourth season in 2018 as Indiana's pitching coach. In August 2016, he was elevated to the program's Associate Head Coach. He has 16 years of Division I coaching experience.

During his 15-year stint as an assistant at Ole Miss (2002-07), Clemson (2008-09), Alabama (2010), East Tennessee State (2012-14) and Indiana (2015-present), Bunn has tutored a National Freshman of the Year (two-way player), a Conference Player of the Year (two-way player), a Conference Pitcher of the Year and two Conference Freshman of the Year.

A 1999 graduate of The Citadel with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration and minor in Law & Legal Processes, Bunn was a three-year letter winner for the Bulldogs, earning the team's Ace Pitching Award in 1999. He helped The Citadel to back-to-back Southern Conference Tournament titles in both 1998 and 1999, and a regular season championship in 2000.

Chad Caillet // University of Southern Mississippi



Chad Caillet has served over ten seasons as an assistant coach in Hattiesburg. During the summer of 2016, he was promoted to Associate Head Coach. Caillet has spearheaded the efforts resulting in some of the program's most-highly regarded signing pools. In 2012, he helped land a recruiting class regarded No. 3 by Baseball America.

Caillet, who came to Southern Miss after a brief stint at McNeese State, was an assistant at Southeastern Louisiana University for the 2006 and 2007 seasons. Prior to SLU, Caillet spent four years at Meridian Community College, including one season as its head coach. Other coaching stops included a year at both Mississippi College and Millsaps College after he broke into the coaching ranks with a stint at Copiah-Lincoln Community College.

As a player, Caillet finished his career at Southern Miss, where he earned both his bachelor's degree (1998) and his master's degree (2000). Caillet is married to the former Jessica Compretta of Bay St. Louis, Miss., and they have a daughter, Carsyn, and a son, Coby.

Nolan Cain // Louisiana State University

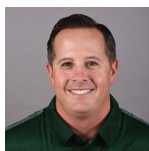


Nolan Cain was promoted to assistant coach/recruiting coordinator in November 2016 after working for one season as the Tigers' volunteer coach and for two seasons as coordinator of operations. His 2017 recruiting class was ranked No. 5 in the nation by Collegiate Baseball newspaper.

A native of Cantonment, Fla. and pitcher on LSU's 2009 national championship team, Cain has handled a number of responsibilities with the baseball program, including team travel, budgeting, community relations and the operation of the Paul Mainieri LSU Baseball Camp.

Cain and his wife, the former Kristen Hobbs, have one son, Cason. Kristen played softball at LSU from 2004-07 and now works as the Special Events and Community Relations Coordinator for the LSU athletic department.

Chris Cates // University of South Florida



Chris Cates joined the USF baseball coaching staff in August 2014. He serves as the team's assistant coach, working with the infielders, guiding the hitters and coaching third base during games. Off the field, he assists with campus recruiting, administration and camps. Cates arrived at USF from the University of Tampa. Prior to his coaching stint at Tampa, Cates was an assistant at Florida State University for the 2013 season.

A Tampa native, Cates graduated from the University of Louisville in 2007 with a bachelor's degree in sports administration. A four-year starter at shortstop for the Cardinals (2004-07), he played an integral role in leading Louisville to its first ever College World Series appearance in 2007. He is married to the former Meagan Suárez, a UT graduate, as the couple was wed on November 3, 2012 in Tampa. They have one son, Cohen.

Nathan Choate // University of San Diego



Nathan Choate wrapped up his first season as pitching coach for the Toreros in 2017. Last season the Toreros struck out 9.7 batters per nine innings, the sixth best rate in the nation and tops in the West Coast Conference.

Before coming to USD, Choate had been the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator at Grand Canyon University for five years. Prior to his time at Grand Canyon, Choate spent four years at UC Riverside. Before UCR, Choate was the pitching coordinator for UC Irvine, which finished fourth at the 2007 College World Series.

Choate pitched collegiately at Cal Poly for two seasons. He also pitched two seasons at Santa Ana Junior College in 1998 and 1999, helping the Dons to a third-place national finish in 1999. He is married to Lori Choate and has three kids, Kamdyn, Chance and Kyla.

Matt Collins // University of Louisiana at Monroe



Matt Collins, a 2010 ULM graduate, returns to his alma mater for the 2018 season after spending the past three years working at Stephen F. Austin State. He served a three-year stint at McNeese State prior to SFA. At McNeese State, he served as an assistant coach from 2012-14. Collins worked primarily with the hitters

while also serving as the team's recruiting coordinator.

Prior to playing at ULM, Collins played two seasons at LSU-Eunice where he helped the team to its first national junior college championship while serving as team captain. He is a native of Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

Eddie Cornejo // University of California, Santa Barbara



Eddie Cornejo is in his sixth season as assistant coach/recruiting coordinator for the UCSB baseball program. One of the top recruiters on the west coast, Cornejo was named the top recruiter in the Big West by D1Baseball.com. Thanks in part to Cornejo's work on the recruiting trail and on the practice field, UCSB has had two of its most historic seasons during his tenure. Most notably, Cornejo helped UCSB reach the College World Series for the first time ever in 2016.

As a player, Cornejo spent six professional seasons with the Oakland Athletics and Colorado Rockies organizations. A standout All-Region and All-Big 12 selection at the University of Oklahoma, Cornejo led his team in batting average (.393) and RBIs (49) in 2003. Prior to OU, he was an All-American shortstop at Riverside City College. Cornejo has a master's degree in education from Cal State San Bernardino and a bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of Oklahoma. He and his wife Melissa had their first child, Dante, in December 2015.

Trip Couch // University of South Carolina

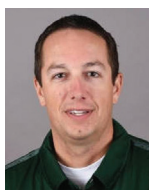


Trip Couch accepted a position at the University of South Carolina in July 2017 after spending seven seasons with the University of Houston, his second stint with the program, as recruiting coordinator and took over a more active role with the offense.

Following his first stint with the University of Houston (1995-2000), Couch served as an assistant at Texas in 2001 before joining the Arizona Diamondbacks as a scout in 2002. He scouted in the state of Texas and Louisiana and oversaw all try-out camps in the territory. While with Arizona, Couch signed four players that have reached the Major Leagues. He was also assistant coach at Louisiana-Lafayette from 1991-92.

Couch is married to the former Tiffany Williams. The couple has three daughters, Chandler Gray, Kendall Blair and Katelyn Richardson.

Mike Current // University of South Carolina



Mike Current enters his first season as the assistant coach/recruiting coordinator for South Carolina baseball in 2018. Current spent the previous three seasons at the University of South Florida, serving as the team's assistant coach, recruiting coordinator, hitting coach and working with the outfielders.

He was also instrumental in helping the Bulls to a consensus

top-10 recruiting class in the fall of 2015, the program's first ever top-25 class. Current arrived at USF after playing a major role in the transformation of the Illinois State University program during a nine-year stint there.

Current, who earned his master's degree in sport management from Illinois State in May 2007, resides in Columbia with his wife, Heather, and daughter, Evelyn.

Drew Dickinson // University of Illinois



Drew Dickinson completed his seventh year as Illinois' pitching coach in 2018, after serving two stints as a volunteer assistant coach in 2009 and 2011. Dickinson oversees the development of Illinois' record-setting pitching staff and is instrumental in recruiting for the Fighting Illini.

Under Dickinson, Illinois' pitching staff has been one of the best in the Big Ten. In 2015, Dickinson earned Skippers Dugout's Division I Assistant Coach of the Year award. He has been an integral part of Illinois' first Super Regional appearance in 2015 and three NCAA Regional berths (2011, 2013, 2015).

A 2009 graduate of Illinois, Dickinson holds a B.S. in communication. He is regarded as one of the best pitchers in Illinois history.

Thomas Eager // Stanford University



Thomas Eager enters his first season at Stanford in 2018, and will serve as the Cardinal pitching coach. Eager also mentored the pitchers at Cal Berkeley for two seasons. He held the same role at Cal Poly for three seasons, where the Mustangs recorded a program-record 47 wins and No. 1 seed at the NCAA Regionals.

Before his promotion to pitching coach, Eager spent two seasons as the Director of Operations for his alma mater, Cal Poly, where he pitched in 2006 and 2007. The Visalia, California, native finished his sophomore season at Cal Poly in 2007 with an 11-3 ledger, on his way to first team All-Big West accolades. He spent four years in the St. Louis Cardinals organization and reached as high as Double-A.

Eager earned a bachelor of science degree in business management from the University of Phoenix in May of 2012 after studying business administration at Cal Poly. He and his wife, Jenna, have two sons, Trey and Blake.

Scott Foxhall // North Carolina State University



Scott Foxhall was named the NC State pitching coach on June 30, 2014. Foxhall joined the NC State staff from Auburn, where he spent the 2014 season as pitching coach and served as the architect of notable Auburn recruiting classes. His last four classes at Auburn were ranked in the Top 25 nationally, peaking with a ninth-place ranking ahead of the 2013 season.

Before heading to Auburn, Foxhall had an outstanding run at the College of

Charleston. In 18 years as a collegiate coach, Foxhall helped develop seven major leaguers in his coaching careers at Auburn and College of Charleston.

Foxhall spent two years as a pitcher at Auburn before heading to College of Charleston. The Greer, S.C., native earned a degree in Education. He and his wife, the former Laura Ballenger, have twin children, Kade and Kennedy.

Jake Gautreau // Mississippi State University



Jake Gautreau joined Mississippi State in June 2017 as an assistant coach. Most recently, Gautreau served as Certified Player Agent for the Boras Corporation.

In August 2013, Gautreau was named an 'Assistant Ready to Lead' by Perfect Game for his work with the Green Wave in his first four years on the staff. During his tenure at Tulane from 2010-14, Gautreau served as the program's recruiting coordinator, hitting instructor and infielders coach.

Gautreau was named Conference USA Player of the Decade in 2005 in recognition of his career accomplishments at Tulane. After being drafted by the San Diego Padres in the first round of the 2001 MLB Draft, Gautreau played professional baseball for eight years before accepting an assistant coach position at his alma mater in 2009.

He is married to Erin Dobyanski Gautreau, a former Tulane volleyball player, and the couple have two sons, William (4) and Weston (2). The McAllen, Texas, native earned his Bachelor of Arts in media arts from Tulane in 2011.

Ben Greenspan // Arizona State University



Ben Greenspan enters his fourth season in 2018 at Arizona State. He was named the associate head coach in late 2017 and serves as recruiting coordinator. Excelling in his recruiting coordinator position, Greenspan assembled the No. 1 recruiting class in the nation in 2016 according to Collegiate Baseball Newspaper. The 2017 recruiting class was No. 4 by both Collegiate Baseball and

Baseball America. Greenspan also spent six seasons as an assistant coach at Indiana. He mentored some of the most prolific hitters in IU program history, including two-time All-American Kyle Schwarber.

Greenspan played for two seasons at IU, and was a Hoosier team captain and Academic All-Big Ten performer in 2007. He spent two years at the University of Connecticut as a catcher and first baseman before joining the IU program. Greenspan earned a bachelor's degree in Sport Marketing and Management and a master's degree in Sport Administration from Indiana University.

He is originally from West Point, N.Y., and is married to his wife, Janine. The pair have two children, Grayson and Adalyn.

Matt Hobbs // Wake Forest University



Matt Hobbs joined the Wake Forest coaching staff in 2014 and enters his fourth year as the pitching coach. Prior to Wake Forest, he spent 2011-2013 at the University of Missouri.

Hobbs spent the 2010 season as the pitching coach at the University of San Francisco. Before USF, Hobbs spent three years as the associate head coach, pitching coach and recruiting coordinator at UC-San Diego. Prior to his stint at UC-San Diego, Hobbs spent two seasons as the pitching coach at Santa Barbara City College. Hobbs also served one season as an assistant coach at Chapman University.

Hobbs pitched at Missouri from 1999-2002. Hobbs was drafted twice, first by the San Diego Padres in 2001 and then by the Kansas City Royals in 2002.

Hobbs and his wife, Marta, have two daughters, Addison and Taylor, and a son, Will.

Jason Kelly // University of Washington



Jason Kelly joined the Washington staff as pitching coach in August of 2012, after having spent the previous six seasons developing a top-notch pitching staff at Cal Poly. He was promoted to Associate Head Coach in 2014. In five seasons since joining Washington, Kelly has been integral in making the Huskies' pitching staff year-in and year-out among the best in the Pac-12. He has also earned a reputation as one of the nation's top recruiters, assembling nationally renowned classes on a yearly basis.

Before Cal Poly, Kelly spent two seasons at Chico State. Prior to coaching at Chico State, Kelly spent one season (2004) working in baseball operations at Cal Poly and one season (2003) coaching at Cuesta College in San Luis Obispo.

Kelly was a pitcher at Cal Poly in 1999. After redshirting in 2000, he went on to pitch at Cuesta in 2001 and at Missouri Valley College in 2002. A native of Santa Maria, Calif., Kelly and his wife, Tracy are the parents of two young children, daughter Peyton and son Cade.

Karl Kuhn // University of Virginia



The Virginia pitching staff has met unparalleled success in the past 14 seasons under pitching coach Karl Kuhn. Since 2005 Virginia owns the second lowest earned run average in the nation. Five of Kuhn's UVA proteges have gone on to reach the major league level. He was named Collegiate Baseball's 2014 National Pitching Coach of the Year after UVA reached the College World Series Finals.

Virginia first advanced to the College World Series in 2009, setting off a remarkable stretch. UVA owns the second-most wins in the nation in this decade. The Cavaliers reached the pinnacle of college baseball in 2015 as UVA earned its first NCAA national championship.

The first assistant coach to be hired at Virginia under head coach Brian O'Connor, Kuhn arrived in Charlottesville after serving as the associate head coach and pitching coach at Arkansas-Little Rock for seven years from 1997-2003. Before coaching at UALR, Kuhn spent three years as the pitching coach at Charleston Southern. Kuhn is a 1992 graduate of Florida, where he was a student-athlete. He is married to the former Katrina Gosdin and resides in Charlottesville, Va. The couple has two sons, Kason and Kruse.

Bill Mosiello // Texas Christian University



Bill Mosiello joined the TCU coaching staff in the summer of 2013. He serves as the associate head coach, overseeing the role of hitting/offensive coach. Since his arrival on campus, Mosiello has helped guide the team to four straight appearances in the College World Series. He came to TCU after spending two seasons at Tennessee.

He has over 20 years of collegiate coaching experience and seven more years of experience as a minor league manager. Mosiello served as the manager of the Angels Double-A affiliate, the Arkansas Travelers, where he tutored phenom Mike Trout for two seasons.

Mosiello made the move to the Division I level in 1991 at Cal State Fullerton, where he spent two seasons. In 1992, the Titans advanced to the College World Series championship game. After his two years at Tennessee (1993-94) and one season as the pitching coach at Ole Miss, Mosiello spent five seasons (1996-2000) at Oklahoma with part of his tenure as associate head coach.

Chris Prothro // University of South Alabama



Chris Prothro enters his third season as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at South Alabama in 2018. In his first season with the Jaguars, USA captured a Sun Belt Conference championship. USA's 2017 recruiting class was recognized as one of the Top 25 by Collegiate Baseball.

Prior to joining the USA staff, Prothro spent eight seasons at Nicholls State, where he served as associate head coach and recruiting coordinator for his final four years. Prothro also served as assistant coach at North Iowa Area Community College.

Prothro lettered for two seasons at Arkansas State (2004-05) as a catcher, and earned his bachelor's degree in history from ASU in 2005. He also served as a graduate assistant at ASU prior to receiving his degree. He began his collegiate playing career at Northwestern State.

Kirk Saarloos // Texas Christian University



Kirk Saarloos joined the coaching staff in the summer of 2012 after two seasons as the pitching coach at Cal State Fullerton. He assumed the duties of pitching coach. In the summer of 2013, Saarloos was promoted to recruiting coordinator.

In his short time at TCU, his presence has been felt both on the field and off the field. Saarloos, in addition to his duties as the recruiting coordinator, has mentored one of the nation's top pitching staffs over the last five seasons, which has been key factor in TCU's four straight trips to the College World Series. For his efforts, Saarloos was named the 2016 D1Baseball.com National Assistant Coach of the Year award.

Saarloos joined the Cal State Fullerton coaching staff in 2011 after wrapping up a seven-year major league playing career. As a player at Cal State Fullerton, he went on to earn first-team All-American honors. Saarloos and his wife, Kristen, have a son, Brady, and two daughters, Emery and Lane.

Justin Seely // Texas A&M University



Justin Seely was named assistant coach in 2010 after spending the 2009 season as the Aggies' volunteer assistant coach. He serves as the recruiting coordinator and works with the outfielders and hitters. In all eight of his years with the program, Texas A&M has made trips to the NCAA Tournament.

He came to A&M after spending 2008 as an assistant coach at Texarkana College.

A starter on Nebraska's first two College World Series teams, Seely spent the 2006 and 2007 seasons as a volunteer assistant at his alma mater. Seely spent the two seasons prior to Nebraska as an assistant coach at Paris (Texas) Junior College.

A native of Nacogdoches, Texas, Seely began his collegiate career at Northeast Texas Community College. Seely, who received his undergraduate degree from the University of Nebraska in 2003, is married to the former Tara Hill of Garland, Texas. The couple have a son, Slade Andrew, and a daughter, Sydney.

Derek Simmons // Kent State University



Derek Simmons joined the Kent State baseball staff in July 2017. Simmons comes to Kent State from Alabama where he was an assistant coach for a season. Prior to Alabama, Simmons coached for four seasons at Kennesaw State. He has previous Mid-American Conference experience as he was the hitting coach and volunteer assistant coach at Central Michigan from August 2010 to July 2012, helping the Chippewas claim a 2011 MAC West title.

He started his playing career at the University of Montevallo, before becoming a two-year letterwinner and captain at Georgia State. After college, Simmons

played one season in independent professional baseball before entering the coaching profession. He and his wife Erin have two children, Bella and Braxton.

Jon Strauss // Baylor University



Jon Strauss is in his second season at Baylor and brings more than 20 years of collegiate coaching experience after spending six seasons at Pepperdine (2010-2015) as the team's pitching coach and recruiting coordinator, and serves the same role at BU.

Prior to his time at Pepperdine, Strauss had three separate stays with Long Beach State as an assistant coach (1995-2000, 2006, 2008-09). Among his other coaching stops, Strauss spent the 2007 season as an assistant coach at San Jose State. From 2003-05 he was the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator for Loyola Marymount. From 2001-02 he was head coach at Glendale Community College.

Connor Smith // Dallas Baptist University



Connor Smith is entering his eighth year with Patriot Athletics and fourth year as Director of Athletics for the Patriot Athletic Department. Smith has previously served as the Acting Director of Athletics as well as the Assistant Director of Athletics for Internal Operations for the Patriots.

Soto was appointed as director of major gifts in 2008 after one year in the same role at the university's central development office. Sheahon Zenger // University of Kansas



Dr. Sheahon (SHAY-un) Zenger's genuine care for coaches and student-athletes has hallmarked his career in intercollegiate athletics. That care, which he has exhibited since his arrival as Athletics Director in January 2011, has helped KU's coaches and student-athletes achieve outstanding performances on both the conference and national stages. During 2015-16, 12 KU

teams were represented in NCAA postseason competition, the most-ever KU appearances in one year.

He came to KU after serving for five years as athletics director at Illinois State University, helping steer ISU Athletics to a place of prominence in the Missouri Valley Conference. Zenger's career took several turns before landing in athletics administration. He coached football at Drake University right after graduation; he then joined Bill Snyder's staff at Kansas State, serving in key roles. He also coached at South Florida and Wyoming.
