ADMINISTRATORS

JARED BENKO GEORGIA SOUTHERN



Jared Benko was hired in 2020 as the leader of the Georgia Southern Athletics. At GSU, Benko has successfully hired eight head coaches to take over the helms of those programs. Last year, the Athletic Foundation set a record in new pledges and outright gifts. Further, ground was broken on the Anthony P. Tippins Indoor Practice Facility and the Hill Convocation Center, giving the department more than \$70 million in new projects.

Benko, who has more than a decade of progressive leadership experience in the Southeastern Conference (SEC), came to Statesboro from Mississippi State where he served as Deputy Director of Athletics/Chief Financial Officer for nearly four years (2016-2020). At MSU, Benko assisted the director of athletics with strategic planning, personnel decisions, and public relations initiatives while also serving as the CFO and administered day-to-day operations for 16 varsity Bulldog sports, over 365 student-athletes, 20 facilities, and nearly 250 employees.

A noted fundraiser with a strong background in revenue generation, Benko arrived in Starkville after serving as the assistant athletic director for finance at Auburn (2015-16). While at Auburn, Benko helped secure a \$121 million multi-media rights deal with FOX Sports. He was tabbed the 2015 College Athletic Business Management Association's Rookie of the Year for his efforts within the organization.

Benko spent four years in business operations at Arkansas. Before his time at Arkansas, Benko served as the assistant director of business operations at his alma mater of Georgia from 2008 to 2011. The Watkinsville, Georgia native, earned a Bachelor of Science in sports studies from Georgia in 2005 and then a master of public administration in Athens in 2007. Benko and his wife, Sarah, have two sons, Hudson and Cooper.

LISA CAMPOS TEXAS - SAN ANTONIO



Dr. Lisa Campos has made an immediate and positive impact on the athletics department, university, and community since being hired in 2017. One of Campos' first tasks upon her hiring was to develop and implement a new strategic plan for the future of UTSA Athletics. Campos has overseen the highest fundraising year in UTSA Athletics history, while also achieving the highest back-to-back fundraising years in department history.



Under Campos' leadership, UTSA led Conference USA in average home attendance during her first full football season in the Alamo City and again in 2021. Campos currently sits on the NCAA Division I Council, a high-level group responsible for the day-to-day decisions that impact Division I athletics. She also serves as chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Oversight Committee and on the board of the LEAD1 Association, a membership organization that represents the NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision athletics directors.

Campos also has served as chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Oversight Committee and NCAA Women's Soccer Committee, and has been a member of the NCAA Division I Football Oversight Committee, NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet and NCAA Rifle Committee.

Campos came to UTSA after five years as the Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics at Northern Arizona University (NAU). In Spring 2017, she was recognized by Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal's Forty Under 40. Prior to her time at NAU, Campos was an associate athletics director (2003-06) and senior associate athletics director (2006-12) at UTEP after serving as the university's assistant dean of students from 2001-03.

Campos earned both her bachelor's degree in business administration and her master's degree in student affairs in higher education from Colorado State. She holds a doctorate degree in educational leadership from UTEP. She and her husband, Darren D'Attilio, have a son, Christopher.

SCOTT CARR **FLORIDA INTERNATIONAL**



Scott Carr was named Florida International University's athletic director on Dec. 1, 2021. Carr boasts 25-years of experience in intercollegiate athletics and arrived at FIU following a stint at the University of Central Florida, where he served as deputy and interim athletic director. As deputy athletics director, he had oversight of ticket sales and operations, corporate sales and partnerships, the annual fund, brand advancement, strategic communications and gameday experience. Also, Carr assisted directly with a number of head coach hires, including the hiring of head football coach Josh Heupel in December 2017.

Prior to arriving at UCF, Carr served as senior associate athletic director for external affairs at Auburn University. At Auburn, Carr had direct oversight of the marketing and promotions department, including ticket sales, ticket office, event management and community relations.

Prior to Auburn, Carr served in various capacities at Southern Mississippi for eight years (2001-2009). The final position he held in Hattiesburg was deputy director of athletics, external affairs (2006-2009), where he served as the number two executive of the department. Previously, Carr worked in multiple, ascending roles with the FedEx Orange Bowl in Miami, Florida (1997-2001).



Carr is a native of Gainesville, Florida, and earned his undergraduate degree in business management from the University of Florida in 1995. He earned his master's degree in sports management from Florida in 1997. He is married to the former Pam Snowe. The couple has two daughters, Ashton and Katie, and one granddaughter, Kylie.

JOHN COHEN AUBURN



John Cohen, who has more than two decades as a coach and administrator in the Southeastern Conference, was named the 16th Director of Athletics at Auburn University, in October 2022. Cohen has spent the previous 14 years at Mississippi State in various capacities, most recently as the athletic director the past six years.

Cohen's career in college athletics began as a baseball player at Mississippi State before entering the coaching ranks for 25 years that included being a two-time SEC Coach of the Year at MSU. Named director of athletics at MSU on November 4, 2016, Cohen led the Bulldog program to record-breaking success athletically, academically and in facilities enhancement during his tenure.

A nationally respected leader within intercollegiate athletics, Cohen serves on the prestigious 10-member NCAA Division I Baseball Committee as part of a four-year term that began on September 1, 2019. Cohen is one of 16 individuals who both played and coached in the College World Series, and one of just two among that elite group that later served as director of athletics for a participating school. He is one of three active SEC athletics director to hire an eventual national championship winning head coach in any sport.

As a baseball player at MSU, Cohen was a key player on the Bulldogs' 1990 College World Series team. He graduated from MSU with a degree in English in 1990 and received a master's degree in sports management from the University of Missouri in 1994. Cohen and his wife, Nelle, have two children, Jordan, and Avery.

JIM COLE MERCER



Jim Cole assumed duties as Director of Athletics for Mercer University on July 1, 2010. Prior to being named Director of Athletics, Cole served as Mercer's Senior Associate Director of Athletics for External Affairs, heading up the Mercer Athletics Foundation while also serving as a State Representative in Georgia and working in private business.

Cole has helped vault Mercer into the upper echelon of Division I athletic programs. During his time as Director of Athletics, numerous facility upgrades have also taken place.

Also, the basketball programs have notched key seasons. In 2014, the men's basketball team made a splash on the national landscape with a stunning 78-71 defeat of No. 6 Duke in the NCAA Tournament second round, while the women won four consecutive Southern Conference regular season titles and clinched a NCAA Tournament berth in 2018 and 2019.

Multiple Mercer student-athletes have gained national, regional and conference recognition since Mercer transitioned into the Southern Conference, including Kyle Lewis, who was college baseball's national player of the year in 2016 as he won the 39th Golden Spikes Award, given annually to the top amateur baseball player in the nation.

Before embarking on an administrative and political career, he coached and played in both the collegiate and professional ranks. Cole came to Mercer as a student-athlete and lettered in baseball from 1990-93 and graduated with honors in 1993. Cole was drafted as a pitcher by the Milwaukee Brewers in 1993 and was named the franchise's Organizational Pitcher of the Year and a finalist for the TOPPS Minor League Player of the Year Award in 1994.

Cole, a native of Augusta, Georgia, is married to the former Gaylyn Lawson, a coach and teacher at Macon's Stratford Academy. The couple resides in Forsyth with their two children, Caroline and Lawson.

TROY DANNEN

TULANE



Troy Dannen was formally introduced as Tulane's 33rd Director of Athletics in December 2015, bringing with him a track record of proven success. Since being named Director of Athletics, Dannen has reinvigorated the Green Wave athletics program with the hiring of 11 of the current 13 head coaches at Tulane including both football and men's basketball, while also revamping the department's senior management team, increasing fundraising and enhancing the student-athlete experience.

Tulane Athletics has raised over \$108 million as part of the institution's Only the Audacious Campaign which publicly launched in December of 2017. Further, it has seen its licensing revenue triple through the re-introduction of the Angry Wave logo. Tulane's fundraising initiatives have experienced continued growth under Dannen's leadership, with a complete restructuring of the Green Wave Club and the introduction of the Olive & Blue Society.

Dannen's leadership has also been felt across the university community and throughout the Division I collegiate landscape. Throughout his administrative career, Dannen has been named to seven NCAA national committees, including the NCAA Transformation Committee.

Dannen came to Tulane after serving eight seasons in the same capacity at the University of Northern Iowa (UNI) from 2008-15.

Dannen is married to Amy, and they have four children: Elle, Emily, Holly, and William.

BLAIR DEBORD

MEMPHIS



Blair DeBord joined the Memphis Athletic Department as Associate Athletics Director of Development in Dec. 2019. In his current role, he is a member of the Athletic Director's Senior Staff, overseeing all development and fundraising operations and is the sport administrator for the Tigers baseball program.

Prior to Memphis, DeBord worked as Assistant Athletic Director for Development & Strategic Initiatives at UNLV from April 2018-Dec. 2019. He previously served as Special Project Manager at Tennessee from 2017-18 and was the Assistant Director of Development at Kansas State from 2016-17.

DeBord graduated from Kansas State in 2014 with a degree in marketing, and he also earned his masters degree in business administration at Kansas State in 2016 while working as a graduate assistant in the development office. He was a first-team All-Big 12 catcher for the Wildcats and earned all-conference academic honors while also being the program's SAAC representative. DeBord also participated in the NCAA's Emerging Leaders seminar.

DeBord and his wife, Ellen, were married in 2015 and have two daughters, Evie and Ruthie. His perfect day involves a Gibson's apple fritter and a chocolate milk in the morning, followed by family time and a Tiger sporting event.

BRYAN DEAN

TEXAS STATE



Bryan Dean joined the Athletic Department in September 2018 as Executive Senior Associate Athletic Director for Business Operations. In his role, he is responsible for managing all financial aspects of the department as well as providing oversight for human resources, contract management, equipment operations, capital projects, and facilities. He also serves as the sport administrator for the baseball program.

Prior to his arrival at Texas State, Dean spent four years at the University of Cincinnati where he served as the Associate Athletic Director - Senior Business Officer. In this role, he provided oversight for the day-to-day business operations, equipment operations and contract management. He also served as sport administer for the men's soccer program and co-sport administer for the football program. Dean began his career in college athletics at Rice University in 2011.

Dean has been an active member of College Athletic Business Management Association (CABMA) and has previously served on the membership and programing committee. He currently is serving as a mentor in the mentorship program.



Dean, a native of Missouri City, Texas, graduated from Texas A&M University. He is married to Deborah, and they have three daughters – Avery, Isabella, and Madeline.

RICHARD DURAN

INCARNATE WORD



In 2020, Richard Duran became the youngest sitting Division I athletic director. Duran, who came to UIW as the deputy athletics director responsible for all external functions of the department in October 2017, took over the interim position on Aug. 12, 2019.

Under Duran's leadership, UIW Athletics had tremendous success in the classroom, in the community, competition, revenue generation, and fan engagement. He guided a team of 80 full-time employees, five part-time employees, 35 graduate assistants and 18 work study students in creating a holistic and positive experience for more than 500 student-athletes.

Under Duran, the Cardinals Club annual fund program saw record numbers in both memberships and revenue. Likewise, athletic sponsorships reached new heights in 2019-20. UIW Athletics had a record number of athletic sponsors and boasted record revenues.

Duran, a Montebello, California, native, has worked at four universities -- the University of California, Riverside, the University of Louisiana Monroe, California State University, Los Angeles, and the University of the Incarnate Word. At each stop, he has contributed in every facet. He has helped fundraise more than \$25 million in his career. In addition to fundraising, Duran works to increase the functionality and productivity of every department, whether that involves streamlining a new website, leading rebranding efforts, guiding facility renovations, or helping coordinate the creation of the department's first strategic plan.

Duran graduated from Whittier College in 2011 after playing football for the Poets for four years. He obtained a master's degree from the University of San Francisco in 2013 and is currently pursuing his doctorate and working on his dissertation at Louisiana Tech University.

MAGDI EL SHAHAWY

GEORGIA



Dr. Magdi El Shahawy became the Deputy Athletic Director for Academics and Student Development at the University of Georgia in September 2018. In his current role Dr. El Shahawy has administrative oversight for Student Athlete Academic Services, The Georgia Way (student-athlete leadership, personal development, career development, and community service programs), Behavioral Medicine, and Sports Nutrition. Additionally, Dr. El Shahawy is the Sport Facilitator for the UGA baseball program.

Prior to his appointment at UGA, Dr. El Shahawy served as the Senior Associate Athletic Director at the University of Southern California. In the 18 years Dr. El Shahawy was at USC (2000-2018), he held administrative oversight of Student-Athlete Academic Services, Student-Athlete Personal Development Programs, and the Athlete Career Transition Program. He also served as sport administrator for baseball.

Prior to USC, El Shahawy held positions as Senior Associate Director of Student-Athlete Support Services at Michigan State (1999-2000), Academic Counselor and Eligibility Coordinator at Florida State (1994-99), and Graduate Assistant in Athletic Compliance at Florida State (1993-94).

A four-year varsity football letterman at Florida State University (1986-89), he received three degrees from FSU, including a Ph.D. in 1999. He is married to Kimberly El Shahawy and they have two sons, Madison and Micah.

JOEL ERDMANN

SOUTH ALABAMA



Since 2009, Dr. Joel Erdmann has presided over one of the most successful eras in the University of South Alabama's history. Over the past decade-plus, Erdmann's impact includes: milestone records both on the field and in the classroom by student-athletes, the beginning of an NCAA Division I FBS football program, new construction or renovation in every sport, unprecedented fundraising, and the hiring of championship-driven coaches as well as a stellar team of administrative professionals and staff. Erdmann's championship mindset lead to the department's best-ever Academic Progress Rate scores and GPA in the history of Jaguar Athletics and the Sun Belt Conference All-Sports Championship Vic Bubas Cups, four years in a row.

Erdmann has been entrusted to serve on both football and baseball championship selection committees. In baseball, Erdmann served a four-year term on the prestigious NCAA Division I Baseball Championship Committee where he served as Chairman of the Championship Selection Committee for the 2016 College World Series.

The Bismarck, North Dakota native was a baseball coach for over a decade before starting his career in athletics administration in 1997. After a two-year stint as executive director of the Jaguar Athletic Club at South Alabama, Erdmann was named director of athletics at the University of North Alabama in 2002. From 2007-2009, he served as director of athletics at Southeastern Louisiana University.

Erdmann has three degrees: a bachelor's degree in education from South Dakota State University, a master's degree from the University of South Alabama, and Ph.D. from Florida State University. He played four years for the South Dakota State baseball team. Erdmann and his wife, Tina, reside in Mobile.

JON FAGG

TEXAS-ARLINGTON



Jon Fagg is in his first year as the Director of Athletics at UTA. He officially began his tenure with the Mavericks on Aug. 1, 2022. For the prior 14 years, Fagg served in various positions at the University of Arkansas, culminating as its Deputy Athletics Director. With the Razorbacks, Fagg assisted the daily administration of the department and provided direct oversight of its NCAA compliance program; academic support; student-athlete development; and name, image and likeness units. He also oversaw other administrative units, including mental health and performance, strength and conditioning, sports nutrition and major gift development. He most recently served as the sports administrator for the football and swimming and diving programs and had oversight of the women's soccer and men's basketball programs.

Prior to joining Arkansas in 2008, Fagg spent seven years at North Carolina State, first as an Assistant Athletics Director and then as Associate Athletics Director. He also spent three years as Assistant Athletics Director for Compliance at Fresno State and a year as Director of Compliance for the Big South Conference.

His first athletics administrative experience came at Mars Hill College where he handled compliance duties, in addition to serving as an assistant coach for the football team for three seasons. His coaching experience also includes a stint as an assistant coach at Davidson from February 1992 to June 1993 and as a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater, the University of Arizona, from January 1991 to February 1992. Fagg and his wife, Amanda, have three children: Jon Madison and twins, Reed and Ellie.

NATE FRIELING

DALLAS BAPTIST



Nate Frieling is in his 20th year at Dallas Baptist University and twelfth as an administrator overseeing Patriot Baseball. The Dallas native has been an integral part of the DBU Baseball program since it transitioned to NCAA Division I competition beginning with the 2004 season and has helped the Patriots to unprecedented success over the past two decades.

Frieling graduated from Southwestern University in 2000 with a Bachelor of Arts after spending four years under the wing of legendary baseball coach, Jim Mallon. He earned his Master of Science in Education degree from Baylor University where he worked with the baseball program for three years. From Waco, Frieling returned to his home city in 2003 as an Assistant Baseball Coach at Dallas Baptist University. In his first season, the Patriots won 44 games and captured the National Christian College Athletic Association National Championship trophy. In 2007 at DBU, Frieling was named Recruiting Coordinator by first-year Head Coach Dan Heefner.

After the 2011 season, Frieling stepped away from coaching and into his role overseeing athletic operations, facilities management, and internal operations for DBU Baseball. He created the Patriot Broadcasting Network in 2012 and had a part in the design and fundraising efforts to build Joan and Andy Horner Ballpark in 2013.

Frieling and his wife, Joy, reside in North Richland Hills with their three children and are members of Crown of Life Lutheran Church in Colleyville.

KEN HALPIN

PURDUE



Dr. Ken Halpin joined Purdue in August 2021 as its deputy athletics director and chief operating officer. Halpin's role as chief operating officer calls on him to provide direction and oversight for revenue generation activities, strategic communications, brand enhancement, marketing and fan experience, sports medicine and performance, events, facilities and capital projects.

Previously, Halpin served as vice president and director of intercollegiate athletics for Winthrop University from May 2016 to July 2021. Highlights during Halpin's tenure include six championships by the men's basketball program and Winthrop's Eagle Club membership more than doubled.

Prior to his arrival at Winthrop, Halpin served as deputy athletic director for Eastern Washington. During his time at EWU, Halpin oversaw all external operations, which included such notable achievements as a 122-percent increase in external revenue and 60-percent increase in annual scholarship fund membership.

Halpin received a Ph.D. in education from Washington State University in 2015 and a Master's in sport administration from Gonzaga University in 2008, where he taught as an adjunct professor in the sport management program for seven years. He earned a Bachelor's degree from Willamette University in 2005, where he was an all-conference performer in both football and baseball.

Halpin is married to his wife, Amber, and the two have three children, Kenny, Jonathan, and Jill Marie.

DAVID HANSEN

CENTRAL FLORIDA



David Hansen joined UCF in 2006 and currently serves as the senior executive associate athletics director and chief operating officer, following his promotion to executive associate athletics director in January 2016. Hansen's primary duties include oversight of UCF athletics facility development, home event management and procurement, while providing oversight of two Knights athletics teams.

Hansen directs the athletics facility master planning process and serves on UCF's master planning committee. He also serves as a sport administrator for the Knights' baseball and rowing programs and assists with the football program.

Parker Bangs was named the Owls' pitching coach on June 30, 2022. He joined the Owls after four seasons at Davidson, where his staff led the conference and finished eighth nationally with a 3.86 ERA. The Wildcats staff was led by senior Blake Hely, who earned Atlantic 10 Conference pitcher of the year honors.

Bangs joined the staff at Davidson after three seasons at Presbyterian College. He led the Blue Hose to many program-bests since moving to Division I, including strikeouts, saves, and ERA in 2017. The squad also allowed its fewest runs and earned runs since 2013 as the team recorded a D1-era best 32 wins. In 2016, Bangs' staff helped spark Presbyterian's first-ever appearance in the Big South title game.

Bangs played collegiately at South Carolina from 2008-10 and was a member of the Gamecock's 2010 College World Series championship team. He was drafted by Kansas City in the 31st round of the 2010 MLB Draft, where he made 17 appearances over three minor league seasons before retiring after the 2012 season.

Bangs was the head coach of the Wilmington Sharks in the Coastal Plain League for two summers and spent three seasons as head coach of Heathwood Hall Episcopal School in Columbia, S.C. He also served as the pitching/hitting coach for the Columbia Blowfish of the CPL, and as the hitting coach at Dutch Fork High School in Irmo, S.C.

CHRIS BERTRAND

Chris Bertrand enters his fourth season with Northwestern State. Prior to joining the Demons staff, Bertrand spent four seasons as the head coach at UT Tyler. In those four seasons, Bertrand guided the Patriots to a 119-69 record, three American Southwest Conference championships and three NCAA Division III Tournament appearances. He also coached and recruited several players on the Patriots' squad that captured the 2018 NCAA Division III College World Series championship.

Beginning in August 2016, Bicknell was the Texas Scouting Director for Prep Baseball Report, spearheading grass-roots state-wide scouting efforts. In a very short time, PBR Texas became the most trusted resource for amateur baseball scouting in the state. Before moving to Texas, Bicknell spent the 2016 season at the University of Kentucky as the recruiting coordinator.

Before Kentucky, Bicknell spent five seasons at The United States Air Force Academy. Prior to the Air Force Academy, Bicknell spent two seasons at Davidson where the 2009 team improved in eight offensive categories. He was also a volunteer assistant coach at Clemson, after spending two years as an assistant coach at UNC Pembroke.

In 2002, Bicknell started at third base for Wingate University. He earned a BA from Wingate in 2002, and an MA from UNC Pembroke in 2006. Bicknell, a Charlotte native, graduated from Charlotte Christian School in 1997 where he lettered in both Football and Baseball.

Josh Blakley begins his fourth year overall with Texas State. He was hired in July 2019 as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. Previously, he served as a volunteer assistant for the Bobcats.

Blakley spent the 2019 campaign as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for UT Rio Grande Valley. In his lone season he helped UTRGV win the WAC regular season championship for the program's first conference title since 1955.

Prior to his arrival in San Marcos, Blakley was the head coach at Ranger College from 2013-17. He amassed 81 victories during his time leading the Rangers. During his tenure, he sent 23 student-athletes to play Division I baseball. Blakley spent the 2010-12 seasons at McMurry University as the War Hawks pitching coach with the team reaching regionals. Cain is nationally recognized as one of the top recruiters in the nation. Three of his last four recruiting classes at LSU were ranked in the top 5, including a No. 2 rating by Baseball America for his 2020 class. His 2018 recruiting class earned the top spot from Baseball America and Collegiate Baseball. The 2017 class was ranked No. 5 by Collegiate Baseball.

He was a four-year letterwinner at LSU, playing a big role on LSU's 2009 national title run. Cain pitched 3.1 scoreless innings with four strikeouts in Game 2 of the College World Series Finals against Texas. He signed a free agent contract with the Detroit Tigers in June 2009.

Chris Cleary was promoted to Volunteer Assistant Coach of the Ole Miss baseball program in July 2020. A former assistant coach at Creighton and Butler, Cleary joined the Rebel baseball staff in August 2018 as the Coordinator of Operations.

A native of Fresno, California, Cleary joined the Menlo baseball program as a coach for the 2013 season, where he helped lead the program to a record 34 wins and an appearance in the Cascade Conference Championship game. Cleary transitioned to Butler University in 2014, where he served as an assistant coach, working with infielders and assisting with hitters. Zach Dillon was announced as Baylor's hitting coach and recruiting coordinator on June 25, 2022. Dillon returns to Waco after spending the last six years as the director of operations for Twelve Baseball.

Previously, Dillon worked at McLennan Community College during the 2016 season as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. In 2015, Dillon served as the volunteer assistant coach and coordinator of camps at Mississippi State. Prior to joining the MSU staff, Dillon served as an assistant coach at the University of Iowa. While there, he served as the Hawkeyes third base coach, hitting coach and recruiting coordinator responsible in all areas of program development. He returned to Iowa City after helping Baylor in 2012 as a volunteer assistant. MICHAEL EARLEY

TEXAS A&M



Michael Earley enters his second season on the coaching staff as Texas A&M baseball embarks on the 2023 campaign. The Aggies were a resounding success in Earley's first season. The squad finished as one of the final four teams in Omaha for the first time in school history and won the SEC Western Division title. Texas A&M's offense experienced impressive improvement in 2022. The Aggies ranked second in the SEC in batting average and third in on-base percentage. In the 30-game league schedule, the Aggies topped the SEC in batting average, runs, RBI and on-base percentage.



Earley arrived at Texas A&M after five seasons at Arizona State, including four seasons as the hitting coach on Tracy Smith's staff. He has built a reputation for developing hitters with his most notable work being the rise of Spencer Torkelson to the No. 1 overall draft pick in the 2020 MLB Draft. Undrafted out of high school, Torkelson was selected by the Detroit Tigers. Arizona State led the nation in home runs during the 2019 regular season, clubbing 92 dingers.

Earley was an All-Big Ten performer at Indiana University. He played six seasons in the White Sox organization, reaching the Triple-A level with the Charlotte Knights. He is married to his wife, Lisa, and together they have a son, Marshall, and two daughters, Mia and Madison.

KURT ELBIN

VIRGINIA TECH



Kurt Elbin joined the Hokies' staff in June 2017 as an assistant coach/recruiting coordinator. Elbin had worked the prior five seasons at VCU (2013-17) and helped the Rams to four straight 35-plus win seasons, one conference regular season title, one conference tournament title and an NCAA Regional title in 2015 as the team advanced to the Super Regionals for the first time in school history.

Under Elbin's tutelage, the 2017 Rams' offense led the Atlantic 10 Conference in both batting average (.290, 60th in the nation) and on-base percentage (.384, 43rd) and was 14th in the country, first in the league, with 85 hit batsmen. It was the third time in the past four seasons the team had finished in the top 100 in batting average, including 36th in 2014.

Prior to his time in Richmond, Virginia, Elbin spent two seasons (2011-12) at Division II power Shippensburg University (Pa.). During his tenure at Shippensburg, Elbin helped lead the Raiders to 55 wins and back-to-back PSAC Tournament appearances. Before joining the Raiders' staff, Elbin spent three seasons at Thiel College (2008-10). Under his guidance the Tomcats were a Division III powerhouse in the President's Athletic Conference, being ranked as high as 13th nationally during his stint.

A native of Bedford, Pennsylvania, Elbin is a 2006 graduate of Lock Haven University, where he was a three-year starter. He earned a master's degree from California (Pa.) in 2008. Elbin is married to his wife, Jaclyn, and they have two children, Alexander and Juliet.

COOPER FOUTS

LOUISIANA TECH



Cooper Fouts was named Louisiana Tech's recruiting coordinator and pitching/catching coordinator in July 2021. He has 16 seasons of collegiate coaching experience, highlighted by five seasons over two stints at Pepperdine (2011-12, 2016-18). Fouts helped Pepperdine win West Coast Conference titles in 2012 and 2018.

He also had a three-season stint at Purdue, where he led the recruiting efforts. Fouts also coached and developed Boilermaker catchers and assisted with the Purdue offense.

CONNOR GANDOSSY **CREIGHTON**



Connor Gandossy came to Creighton in the fall of 2017 from Saint Louis University, where he served as an assistant coach for four seasons. Prior to coaching at Saint Louis, Gandossy was an assistant coach at Jefferson College.

Gandossy is responsible for recruiting, developing catchers and working with the offense for the Bluejays. Gandossy has been an instrumental part of the Bluejays' successes leading to a trip to the NCAA Regional finals in 2019. The 2019 team was ranked among the top 25 teams in the nation and claimed the BIG EAST regular season and tournament championships.

Gandossy's impact is expected to continue to grow as the Bluejays 2020 recruiting class was rated as one of the Top 50 in the nation by College Baseball Newspaper (CBN) and Baseball America. The 2021 recruiting class was a Perfect Game Top 100 class as well as a Top 75 Class by CBN. It was the third time Gandossy landed Perfect Game Top 100 class, doing so in 2015 and 2016 at SLU.

Gandossy received a bachelor's degree from Saint Louis University in 2012 and earned a master's degree in leadership from Creighton. NEBRASKA



Lance Harvell joined Nebraska in June 2019 as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. He has spearheaded the Huskers' recruiting efforts with success. Their 15-member 2021 recruiting class, which included a trio of top-200 prospects, was ranked 20th by Perfect Game and 21st by Baseball America.

Prior to coming to Lincoln, Harvell spent five seasons at Sam Houston State as the team's assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. During that span, the Bearkats captured four Southland Conference regular-season titles. In 2016, Harvell established himself as the top recruiting coordinator in the Southland Conference by D1Baseball.com. In 2017, Sam Houston State advanced to its first-ever NCAA Super Regional and finished nationally ranked in all six polls.

Harvell spent two years as the volunteer assistant at Louisiana in 2013 and 2014. Harvell helped guide the Ragin' Cajuns to national prominence and the best offense in the country two straight years. The 2014 team finished the season with a 58-10 record, the third-best record in NCAA history. At the end of the regular season the Cajuns were the consensus No.1 team by every poll.

Harvell spent three years at Texarkana College from 2010 to 2012. He also spent the 2008 and 2009 seasons as a graduate assistant coach at Texas A&M.

During his playing days, Harvell was an all-conference catcher at Richland Community College in Dallas. In 2003 and 2004, he led his team to back-to-back NJCAA national titles. Harvell walked on at Texas A&M and graduated in 2006 with a bachelor's degree in sport management and earned his master's degree in the same field in 2009. ANTHONY IZZIO

TULANE



Anthony Izzio returned to Tulane in the summer of 2022 after two seasons away. He manages the pitching staff and recruiting obligations. In between his two Tulane stints, Izzio spent two seasons as the pitching coach at Charleston Southern University. He was responsible for recruiting and shaping the second Freshman All-American in program history.

Prior to his time at Tulane, Izzio served three seasons as the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator at Pearl River Community College in Mississippi.

During his time with the Wildcats, Izzio helped PRCC earn three consecutive National Junior College Athletic Association D-II regional appearances, with an appearance in the NJCAA D-II World Series in 2019. In five years at the junior college level, Izzio assisted in turning 37 players over to D1 universities.

WALT JONES

EASTERN KENTUCKY



Walt Jones joined the EKU staff as assistant coach/recruiting coordinator in November of 2020. He serves as the hitting instructor, and coaches base running and outfielders. In 2022, he helped secure Eastern Kentucky's first conference title since 2012. The Colonels were picked to finish eighth in the ASUN preseason poll but instead finished tied for the best overall conference record in the league.

Previously, Jones was a scouting director for the Prep Baseball Report-Louisiana and national JUCO scouting director for Prep Baseball Report-National from July 2019 to the fall of 2020. Before his time with Prep Baseball Report, Jones had two stints at Nicholls State University including from 2014-19 as the recruiting coordinator and associate head coach and from 2009-12 as volunteer baseball coach and the director of baseball operations. While at Nicholls, Jones oversaw recruiting, coached the outfielders and hitters, and organized fundraising events.

Jones was an assistant coach at Chipola College from 2012 through 2013 where he coordinated camps and coached all position players and hitters.

HOUSTON



Ross Kivett joined the University of Houston Baseball program as assistant coach on June 28, 2021. His primary responsibilities include serving as hitting coach as well as coaching third base and infielders.

He arrived in Houston following four seasons as an assistant coach at Tennessee.



The Ohio native recently helped vault the Volunteers to a record-setting campaign in 2021, capped by the program's fifth trip to the College World Series and first since 2005. Kivett's main responsibilities at Tennessee included coaching the team's infielders while assisting with baserunning and hitting on top of serving as Tennessee's camp coordinator. One of the biggest areas of improvement for the Vols from year one to year two under Tony Vitello's staff was the fielding and defense, due in large part to Kivett, who worked closely with Tennessee's infielders. UT set a program record and finished 14th nationally with a .979 fielding percentage in 2019 after finishing 140th in the country with a .970 fielding percentage in 2018.

Kivett was an All-American and Big 12 Player of the Year for Kansas State in 2013 before being drafted by the Detroit Tigers. A 2014 graduate of Kansas State with a degree in communication studies, Kivett is the son of Mike and Mary Kivett and has two siblings, Juliana and Jake.

JOE MERCADANTE PITTSBURG



Joe Mercadante joined Pitt as an assistant coach for the 2022 season. He primarily works with the outfielders and assists in recruiting and offensive efforts. Mercadante previously spent four years at Stetson as an assistant coach, serving as the primary hitting coach and recruiting coordinator. In his first season at Stetson, Mercadante helped the Hatters to their most successful season in program history. Stetson hosted and won an NCAA Regional.

Rising from a volunteer coach to an assistant, Mercadante spent seven years (2005-11) at the University of Miami. During that time, he helped the squad make seven-consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances and hone the skills and development of catcher Yasmani Grandal, who was named the ACC Player of the Year. NEVADA



Mark Moriarty joined the Wolf Pack staff this summer after spending the past three seasons (2020-22) as a pitching coach in the Minnesota Twins organization. CLIFF PENNINGTON

DALLAS BAPTIST



Cliff Pennington enters his second season at DBU as the team's recruiting coordinator and assistant coach. Pennington, who played 11 seasons in the major leagues from 2008-2018, comes to DBU from Texas A&M where he was on the coaching staff for two seasons.

Pennington was a standout at Texas A&M from 2003-05 where he was a three-time All-Big 12 selection and earned All-American honors in 2005.

In one of the most decorated careers in Aggie baseball history, Pennington ranks in the top 10 on the Aggies' career list for hits and finished his collegiate career with a .346 batting average in 182 games.

Following his junior season at Texas A&M, Pennington was selected by the Oakland Athletics as the 21st overall pick in the first round of the 2005 Major League Baseball Draft. Three years later, Pennington made his big league debut with the Oakland A's on August 12, 2008. Pennington spent five seasons in Oakland and completed his 11-year career in the Majors with four other teams including the Arizona Diamondbacks, Toronto Blue Jays, Los Angeles Angels and Cincinnati Reds.

The Corpus Christi, Texas, native finished his MLB career with 971 games.

KYLE PETTORUTO

RUTGERS



Kyle Pettoruto is in his fourth year at Rutgers where he coaches outfielders, baserunning and hitting. Under his guidance in 2022, Rutgers had one of the most prolific lineups in all of college baseball. The Scarlet Knights led the country with 9.6 runs/game, 565 total runs and 147 doubles. These marks all proved crucial as Rutgers set a program record with 44 wins.

He spent the previous six seasons at Bryant and was part of six-straight Northeast Conference regular season championships and two NCAA Tournament appearances. Under Pettoruto, Bryant became one of the most dynamic offenses in the country. Pettoruto was a four-year letterman at the University of New Haven and helped the Chargers earn a spot in the 2010 NCAA tournament. He earned a degree in communication from New Haven in the fall of 2012.

MICAH POSEY

DALLAS BAPTIST



Micah Posey enters his third season as the pitching coach at DBU. In his first year with the Patriots, DBU reached the Columbia Super Regional after winning the Fort Worth Regional. The Patriots also clinched both the Missouri Valley Conference regular-season and tournament titles in Posey's first year as the team's pitching coach. DBU compiled the top ERA in the Missouri Valley under Posey's direction in 2021.

He joined the Patriots after spending three seasons at East Tennessee State University. During the shortened 2020 season, Posey's pitching staff at East Tennessee State compiled the sixth-best strikeout-to-walk ratio (4.15) at the NCAA Division I level. In just his second season in 2019, Posey's staff was regarded as one of the best in college baseball, ranking in the top 20 nationally in four categories.

Before his three-year stint at ETSU, Posey spent four years working with the pitching staff at Elon University. In his first season at Elon in 2013, the Phoenix won the Southern Conference Baseball Tournament and reached the finals of the Charlottesville Regional. Prior to his coaching career, Posey was a 15th round selection of the Anaheim Angels in 2001 out of North Florida Christian School. A left-handed pitcher, Posey spent four seasons in the Angels' minor league system. Following his professional baseball career, Posey graduated from Florida State University with a degree in marketing in 2011. He is married to Julie Posey and became a father in April 2018.

NICK SCHNABEL

CLEMSON



Nick Schnabel joined the Clemson staff as assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator on June 27, 2022. Schnabel previously served at Michigan from 2013-22 and was named national assistant coach-of-the-year by the American Baseball Coaches Association in 2019. Michigan finished as the national runner-up in 2019.

Prior to Ann Arbor, Schnabel was East Carolina's hitting instructor, infield coach and recruiting coordinator for three seasons. Before ECU, Schnabel served for two seasons as the hitting instructor, recruiting coordinator and third base coach at Liberty University. Schnabel spent two seasons at the U.S. Military Academy, serving as Army's hitting instructor. Schnabel was at Chipola College in Florida in 2005. He started his college coaching career as a volunteer coach at East Carolina in 2004. That season, ECU won a school-record 51 games and competed in the NCAA Super Regionals. The Pirates finished the season eighth in the country.

Schnabel played at East Carolina, where he was a first team All-Colonial Athletic Association selection. He helped the Pirates to consecutive league championships and top NCAA Regional seeds. Following graduation, Schnabel spent four years in the Montreal Expos organization in five levels of the farm system. JUSTIN SEELY

OKLAHOMA STATE



Justin Seely joined Oklahoma State as an assistant in June 2021. Seely joined the Cowboys after spending the previous 12 seasons on the coaching staff at Texas A&M.

Seely's impact was felt in the program during his first season in Stillwater. After helping OSU sign a recruiting class ranked fifth nationally by Collegiate Baseball, he helped lead the Cowboys to 42 wins, their most since 2016. The Pokes earned a No. 7 national seed in the NCAA Tournament, the fourth time Seely has been part of a nationally seeded team, and the Regional berth was Seely's 14th in 15 seasons as an assistant coach.

Before OSU, Seely came to Texas A&M in 2009 after spending 2008 as an assistant coach at Texarkana College. BRIAN SMILEY

INDIANA STATE



Brian Smiley starts his 14th season in the dugout at Indiana State in 2023. He spent his first eight seasons as an assistant coach before being promoted to associate head coach in July of 2017.

Smiley serves numerous roles within the baseball program, including working with the team's infielders and hitters, coaching third base as well as serving as recruiting coordinator. In 2019, he helped ISU to a 43-18 overall record, while claiming its seventh Missouri Valley Conference Tournament Championship.

Smiley has been a part of two NCAA Tournament berths in his time in Terre Haute, including the first NCAA appearance by the Sycamores since 1995. The Sycamores been ranked in the top-50 in the nation in fielding over the last three seasons and have been consistently ranked at the top of the Missouri Valley.

Over his four years as a student-athlete in collegiate baseball, Smiley, a Mount Vernon, Indiana native, played one season each at Triton and Lincoln Trail Community College before transferring to play two seasons at Arkansas Little Rock. FULLER SMITH

SAM HOUSTON



Fuller Smith enters his fourth season on the Bearkat coaching staff. In 2021, the Bearkats finished as the runner-up in the Southland Conference Tournament. That season Smith assisted in the development of outfielders Colton Cowser and Jack Rogers, one of the top outfield duos in the nation. Cowser was the Southland Conference Player of the Year and a first-team all-American before being drafted by the Baltimore Orioles as the No. 5 overall pick in the MLB Draft, the highest draft pick in Sam Houston and the Southland Conference's history.

Before arriving to Sam Houston, Smith served as the recruiting coordinator and hitting/outfield coach at UT Arlington from 2014-2019. Previously, he served at Ole Miss for the 2011 through 2013. During his first stint at UT Arlington in 2010, Smith served primarily as the team's first-base coach, assisted with hitters, as well as the outfield coach.

Smith originally joined the UT Arlington baseball coaching staff in 2010 after completing his collegiate playing career at Ole Miss. He resides in Huntsville, with his wife, Whitney, and their three children, Harper, Cal, and Haven.

KANSAS STATE



Austin Wates was hired by Kansas State as assistant baseball coach on June 22, 2018. In his role, his primary focus is on the Wildcat hitters, outfielders, and baserunners in addition to recruiting responsibilities.

Wates previously spent two seasons working for the Seattle Mariners as an area scout in South Texas. Wates has built strong relationships in the region that will have an instant impact on recruiting. 
